

There are more than 800 professionals employed in our Public Works department. Together, we are committed to providing safe, reliable, and cost-effective services every day to residents and businesses across the Region.




Water Tower Colouring Page

In addition, they also hold a large supply of water in case of emergencies such as fires.

If you could design a water tower in your neighbourhood, what would it look like? Colour the image below.



Repurposed Items Craft

Instructions:

Create your own community! Design and decorate buildings using toilet paper rolls and/or small boxes. Put all the completed buildings together to create a small community.

Materials required: Toilet paper rolls and/or small boxes (eg: boxes from pudding, macaroni and cheese, soup mix, etc), construction paper, glue sticks, tape, paint, paint brushes, markers, scissors

Step 1: Decorate the exterior.

Step 2: Add doors and windows by painting or drawing them onto the building. You can also draw these on squares of construction paper and then tape or glue them on.

Step 3: Create a roof for each building using a piece of folded construction paper. You can draw on shingles with pens or markers. Attach them to the buildings with tape or glue.




Great Outdoors Scavenger Hunt Bingo
