

CONVERSATION GUIDELINES


- Share ideas in a respectful manner

YORK REGIONAL FOREST - HISTORY

- Late 1800's: Forests cleared for farms and homes
- After the trees were removed, the entire area became a desert-like landscape
- 1920's: Agreement Forest
 Program allowed government
 to plant trees to restore the
 forest and soil




MANAGING THE REGIONAL FOREST

For the past 20 years, the forest has been managed using the current management plan and 5 year operating plans.

The new plan will build on the success of the current plan and highlight:

- Public use
- Conservation
- Harvesting
- Tree Planting



YORK REGIONAL FOREST — TODAY

With careful management over the past 20 years, the forest has grown and flourished.

- 23 forest tracts
- 147 kilometres of trails
- 2,300 total hectares
- First public forest in Canada
 certified by Forest Stewardship Council

CURRENT PUBLIC USE AND TRAILS


More than 600,000 visitors per year enjoy using the multi-use trails for:

VISION

As the heart of the Region's natural landscape, a healthy and ecologically diverse York Regional Forest sustains its communities and inspires its people.

MISSION

In achieving this vision, York Region is a leader in working with nature, communities and people.

GOALS 2019 - 2038

Our main priority is to protect and manage the ecological integrity of the forest to maximize the benefits to the environment, community and residents.

GOAL 1 Strengthen Ecological Integrity

Continue to build the health, diversity, resiliency and sustainability of the York Regional Forest.

 Protect ecological features, improve ecosystem health, and increase biodiversity

Prevent and mitigate impacts of invasive species

 Increase ecological resilience and minimize the impacts of climate change

GOAL 2 Build Understanding of the Broader Benefits

Show that the Forest has environmental and social benefits, making it key to the Region's vision of healthy, thriving communities.

- Promote environmental and social benefits by engaging residents and community networks
- Demonstrate leadership through science, innovation and sharing best practices

GOAL 3 Inspire People

Encourage public use that inspires respect for the Forest and a connection with nature.

- Provide an exceptional visitor experience connecting people and communities with nature
- Manage public use and facilities to protect the Forest and provide a safe and enjoyable visitor experience



IMPLEMENTING OBJECTIVES

Provide an exceptional visitor experience connecting people and communities with nature

- Review of opportunities to balance forest protection, visitor experience and dog walking
- Visitor Experience Plan
- Development of a trail strategy





PUBLIC USE — CRITERIA FOR DECISION MAKING

- Must have minimal or manageable environmental impact
- Must not have significant impact on other Forest users
- In determining the suitability consider any benefits to the community
- Must not pose significant liability for the Region
- Must be manageable and affordable for the Region
- Must be aligned with applicable legislation and regulations

CURRENT PUBLIC USE

- ✓ Walking, running, hiking
- ✓ Dog walking (including service dogs)
- Cycling and mountain biking
- ✓ Cross-Country Skiing
- ✓ Snowshoeing
- ✓ Nature appreciation and wildlife viewing
- Organized recreational and educational events
- ✓ Scientific Research
- ✓ Equestrian / Horseback riding

- Snowmobiling
- Only on OFSC Trails
- ✓ Hunting
- Subject to federal and provincial legislation and local municipal discharge of firearms bylaws
- Only permitted in Pefferlaw, Cronsberry, and Metro Road Tracts
- Fishing
- Subject to federal and provincial legislation

- X Lighting Fires
- **X** Smoking
- **X** Camping
- ➤ Property and trail alteration/creation
- ★ Damaging or removing trees, plants and fungi
- X Alcohol consumption
- × Littering
- Paintballing or pellet gun use
- **X** Fireworks
- Use of unauthorized vehicles including ATVs and dirt bikes

PUBLIC USE RESPONDING TO CHANGE

 Use of Pedal-Assisted Bike Permitted new use

Geocaching
 Permitted within 2m of trail

Use of Drones
 Prohibited to limit disruption to others

Organized Activities
 More guidance and oversight



PUBLIC USE - DOG WALKING

 Currently – Dogs must be on leash or under control

52% of users walk with a dog

 55% of respondents agree that dogs should be on leash except in specific areas

Received 100 specific comments about dogs in the forest


We are seeking further feedback on this popular use




PUBLIC USE - EQUESTRIAN

- Horseback riding will continue to be an approved activity in the York Regional Forest
- 5% of respondents experience the forest on a horse
- Received more than 180 comments about horses in the forest

Horseback riding will continue to be allowed in the York Regional Forest.








Public Use — Dogs on-leash

 98 comments related to dogs on/off-leash, were against dogs being off-leash in the Forest.





THE FOREST IN 2038


Age class distribution 2016
