Emerging Tick-Borne Diseases: Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis and Powassan Virus

INFORMATION FOR YORK REGION HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS

July 4, 2023

- On July 1, 2023, Tick-Borne Diseases (TBDs) Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis and Powassan virus (POWV) were designated reportable as Diseases of Public Health Significance (DoPHS)
- These new pathogens are now reportable to public health.
- All three of these TBDs may be transmitted by the blacklegged tick (ixodes scapularis) which also spreads Lyme Disease.
- York Region is identified as a Lyme disease risk area where blacklegged ticks have been identified and people may come into contact with infected ticks.

ADVISE PATIENTS TO REDUCE THE RISK OF TBD BY:

- Use insect repellent containing DEET or icaridin when outside and apply it according to the manufacturer's instructions
- Cover up exposed skin when you go outside by wearing long-sleeved shirts or jackets, long pants and socks
- Search your body for ticks after spending time outdoors
- Remove attached ticks from your body as soon as possible
- Pay special attention to the following body areas: groin, scalp, underarm and back
- Check your pets regularly for ticks. Although they cannot spread Lyme disease, dogs and cats can bring infected ticks into your home
- Permethrin-treated clothing may provide protection against ticks and mosquitoes
