COVID-19: Resources for People with Disabilities

General resources and supports:

- The <u>federal</u> and <u>provincial</u> governments have information and resources available to support people with disabilities and their caregivers
- The federal government has established a <u>Disability Advisory Group</u> to ensure the interests and needs of persons with disabilities are incorporated into its decision-making and pandemic response
- Provincially, the Ontario Human Rights Commission has issued a <u>policy statement</u> urging that human rights principles remain at the centre of decision-making during COVID-19
