



Toilet lid locks are used to prevent children from playing in the toilet. Access to the toilet bowl can lead to drowning.



Outlet covers are used to cover electrical outlets. These can prevent children from putting fingers or other small objects in electrical outlets which can lead to electrocution.



Cord covers help prevent children from playing with cords and plugs which can lead to electrical burns. These covers can also prevent children from tripping over excess cords which can prevent an injury from a fall.

The use of child safety products, combined with regular safety checks of your home, can help protect your children from common household dangers. These are just some of the products you can use to make your home safer. Take the time to investigate these and other safety products. Find products that are a good fit for your home and are geared towards your children's individual developmental stages and abilities.

Side by side locks are used for cabinets that have doors side by side. These can prevent children from gaining access to poisons or hazardous materials.



Swivel latches can be used for drawers or cupboards. These can prevent children from gaining access to unsafe items such as knives, other sharp objects, household cleaners and medications. Some other types of latches include **spring loaded cabinet latches** or **magnetic cabinet locks**.



Fridge latches are used to keep children out of fridges or bottom mounted freezers. You can also purchase **furniture latches** to strap large pieces of furniture to the wall to prevent furniture from tipping over onto a child. Specialized latches and straps are also available for large televisions and television stands.



Solid/one-piece door stoppers replace traditional spring style stoppers. These prevent children from getting their fingers caught in the spring part of the stopper. Using a one-piece stopper removes the risk of a child choking on the white cap that covers spring style door-stops.



Door knob covers can be placed over the handles of doors leading to the bathroom, basement and garage to prevent children from gaining access to a potentially hazardous room. Different styles of covers are available for different styles of door knobs and handles.



Blind cord winder/cleats are used to wrap blind cords up to keep them out of the reach of small children. Blind cords left dangling, pose a strangulation hazard.



Wall mounted baby safety gates should be placed at the top and bottom of stairs to prevent falls. These must be anchored to the wall, not pressure mounted. Gates can also be placed to block entrance ways to rooms you do not want children to have access to due to hazards.
