## York Region invests \$1.1 million in community service projects for vulnerable residents

**NEWMARKET** – York Regional Council last week approved the disbursement of \$1.1 million to community agencies under its Community Development and Investment Funding (CDIF) Strategy for 17 community service projects in 2006.

Projects range from a community kitchen program that will help 150 low income women to a program that will assist homeless youth in making a successful transition from living on the street to permanent housing.

“Vulnerable individuals and families across York Region will benefit from this purchase of priority community services once again,” said Regional Chair and CEO Bill Fisch. “We are confident the service providers are best equipped to deliver these community programs and by monitoring the use of these dollars and the outcomes we achieve a very cost-efficient and effective way of supporting the needs of residents.”

Under its CDIF Strategy, York Region manages a number of community funding initiatives that provide services to York Region residents. These include the National Child Benefit, the Consolidated Homelessness Prevention Program and the Municipal Purchase of Service Fund.

Last year, approximately 30,000 residents received community services from programs that were purchased under the CDIF Strategy.

In late summer, York Region issued a Purchase of Service Request to purchase community-based services for 2006. Proposals were reviewed by an evaluation team comprised of staff from York Region, as well as funders from other levels of government and the not-for-profit sector.

“The CDIF Strategy provides sound accountability practices to disburse funds within the community through a transparent and equitable process,” said Newmarket Mayor Tom Taylor, Chair of the Region’s Community Services and Housing Committee. “The participation of external funders also allowed initiatives that were not recommended for CDIF funding to be considered by other funding sources.”

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Selection was based on criteria set by Regional Council, provincial and federal funding sources, and focussed on the following priority areas:

- Employment Supports
- Family and Children Services
- Homelessness
- Capacity Building and Sustainability
