RE: York Region Housing – Meeting October 6, 2016 – Proposed affordable housing development on Woodbridge Avenue.

My name is Frank Massara. I have been a York Region resident for 34 years. I was planning to attend the meeting but was unable to as I had to take my elderly mother to the hospital downtown Toronto. I was directed by Gino Rosati's office on Thursday, October 6 to send my letter, along with those of other concerned citizens to you in order to add this to the record for this meeting.

We have a petition signed by nearly a thousand Woodbridge residents (to which I would gladly provide to council upon request), and I am writing this letter in representation of these residents who are concerned about the proposed affordable housing development project on Woodbridge Ave.

## **Here are our main concerns:**

- Numerous studies (including reports prepared by York Region) specify a <u>large influx of senior</u> <u>citizens in our population base</u>, many of which need affordable/assisted housing. We feel that the requirements for these citizens are not being met, and <u>recommend that the proposed</u> <u>development be geared 100% to seniors, and should include all the proper amenities and services to make the facility 'senior friendly', including recreation space, sporting activities and park space.
  </u>
- Here are just a few key statistics sourced from a recent York Region report:
  - o By 2011, over 21% of the regions' population base will be comprised of seniors;
  - The numbers of <u>serious violations</u> (e.g. assault, criminal harassment, robbery, utter threats) <u>against York Region seniors have been increasing</u> between 2008 and 2012;
  - Many <u>current and future seniors are faced with debt and inadequate savings</u>, which is especially important for those with low income and facing chronic health problems;
  - Substantial limitations with the supply of senior's rental housing and new construction projects in York that are building accessible, easy to maintain, and close to amenities and services.
- There is currently a significant amount of <u>congestion</u> on Woodbridge Avenue due to current density
  - A proposed development geared 100% to seniors would have a <u>dramatically lower</u> <u>affect on congestion</u> as seniors typically drive much less.
  - There is currently a 30 unit Senior's complex at the proposed site along with 12 separate affordable housing units, and to increase it to the proposed 160 unit complex is a 281% increase in units. Area citizens recommend that <u>any proposed redevelopment should</u> <u>have no increase in the number of units, in order to reduce congestion and safety issues.</u>

- We recommend that <u>York Region should not condense large affordable developments at a few select sites but spread smaller developments through multiple areas in York Region</u>. Any large condensed affordable housing developments should be built in areas that are less congested like those located behind Vaughan City Hall, and at Yonge and Crosby.
