17 The Community Investment Strategy Recommendations for 2017 Funding

Committee of the Whole recommends adoption of the following recommendations contained in the report dated October 25, 2016 from the Commissioner of Community and Health Services:

- 1. Council approve the one-year community projects listed in Private Attachment 1 to be funded in 2017 under the Community Investment Strategy.
- 2. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to execute Purchase of Service Agreements with the successful agencies.
- 3. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to allocate any new or related funding that may become available under the Community Investment Strategy to current and new projects and activities that fit the criteria of the Community Investment Strategy; and that the Commissioner be authorized to execute Purchase of Service Agreements with agencies that meet this criterion.

Report dated October 25, 2016 from the Commissioner of Community and Health Services now follows:

1. Recommendations

It is recommended that:

- 1. Council approve the one-year community projects listed in Private Attachment 1 to be funded in 2017 under the Community Investment Strategy.
- 2. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to execute Purchase of Service Agreements with the successful agencies.

3. The Commissioner of Community and Health Services be authorized to allocate any new or related funding that may become available under the Community Investment Strategy to current and new projects and activities that fit the criteria of the Community Investment Strategy; and that the Commissioner be authorized to execute Purchase of Service Agreements with agencies that meet this criterion.

2. Purpose

This report provides an update on the results of the 2017 Community Investment Strategy (Strategy) Call for Proposals process with a list of the projects (see Private Attachment 1) recommended for one-year funding in 2017. The list is private because it relates to the security of the property of the Region.

3. Background and Previous Council Direction

The Community Investment Strategy is a flexible, responsive and proactive initiative that addresses key human service needs in York Region

In February 2013, Council approved the <u>Community Investment Strategy</u>. The Strategy is designed to strengthen community services supporting low and moderate income York Region residents.

In providing funding to eligible community agencies that serve low and moderate income York Region residents, the Strategy enhances the expertise and resources of the non-profit sector and enables it to provide cost-effective services.

Chart 1 shows how the investments of the Strategy are directed:




Chart 1 How Investments are Directed

Through its three investment funding streams the Strategy adopts an integrated and flexible approach to promoting community development. The Community-Based service stream provides much needed supports to low and moderate income York Region residents; the organizational development stream helps build the service capacity of agencies serving residents; and the Innovation and Collaboration stream encourages the development of new collective approaches to addressing key human service challenges.

The Strategy's four community results and related action areas direct funding to the key service needs in the Region.

- 1. **Community Health**: low and moderate income residents are healthy and able to make healthy choices.
- 2. **Economic Independence**: low and moderate income residents have and keep jobs that match their skills and have financial stability.
- 3. **Housing Stability**: low and moderate income residents can live in affordable, adequate and suitable housing.
- 4. **Social Inclusion**: low and moderate income residents are connected and able to engage in their communities.

The Action Areas under each of the Community Results identify the specific service gaps in the community where investments are directed. An Action Area under one community result can have positive impacts for other community results.

The allocation of funding is established through an annual twostage Call for Proposals process with results reported to Council in November each year when funding approval is requested

Table 1 provides an overview of the key steps in the annual Strategy cycle.

4. Analysis and Implications

For 2017 funding, the two-stage selection process began in April 2016

Stage One requested Expressions of Interest from community agencies to assess fit with Regional priorities. The call for Expressions of Interest was issued on April 9, 2016 with the release of application guidelines and an application template. The call was extensively advertised in the community using both traditional marketing methods and social media. An information meeting on the funding process provided further details. A dedicated telephone line and e-mail access were available to agencies that required additional information.

At closing on May 6, 2016, the Region received 93 Expressions of Interest totalling \$8.1 million in funding requests.

Based on reviews and scoring of each application against established criteria, a Selection Committee comprised of subject matter experts from Community and Health Services recommended 57 projects to move forward to Stage Two.

The Stage Two call for applications opened August 11, 2016 and closed September 7, 2016. At closing, the Region received 56 applications totalling \$5,290,713.

Agencies were supported with additional information at Stage Two through individual e-mail feedback on each Expression of Interest, an information meeting, the opportunity for one-on-one feedback, a dedicated telephone line and direct e-mail access to Community Development staff.

Of 57 applications received, 33 are recommended for funding

Each Stage Two application was assessed on six criteria by a Selection Committee of Regional managers and consultations with other funders in York Region. Thirty-three one-year projects totaling \$3,340,493 are recommended for 2017 funding.


The recommended projects are listed in Private Attachment 1.

Table 2 outlines the number of recommended one-year projects and allocations under each funding stream. No projects are recommended under the Innovation and Collaboration stream for 2017. At the Expression of Interest stage only one Innovation and Collaboration application scored well enough to proceed to Stage Two. In Stage Two, the application did not score well enough to be recommended for funding.

Funding for the 25 one-year projects in the Community Based Stream is distributed across all four Community Results as shown in Chart 2.



5. Financial Considerations

The Community Investment Strategy is managed within the current approved budget of the Community and Health Services Department. The total amount available for 2017 is approximately \$5.5 million, subject to budget approval.

It is recommended that \$3,340,493 be approved for one-year projects listed in Private Attachment 1. Council previously approved multi-year projects to receive funding for three years beginning January 2015, subject to budget approval. Eighteen projects totaling \$2,083,168 (see Attachment 1) will continue to provide service in 2017.

6. Local Municipal Impact

The one-year projects recommended for funding, together with the multi-year projects will provide funding for community services throughout York Region in 2017. Many community agencies that receive Community Investment Strategy funding develop working relations with local community organizations which help enhance and extend services to residents.

7. Conclusion

The Community Investment Strategy continues to support low and moderate income residents in York Region through the provision of services that contribute to the key human service goals of the Region.

The services purchased through the Strategy help promote community health, economic independence, housing stability and social inclusion.

The Strategy also builds upon and extends existing community supports and promotes community involvement through the engagement of community volunteers. Leveraging the expertise of the non-profit sector complements the Region's programs and has extended our ability to create a stronger, more resilient human services system in York Region.
