- > The vivaNext plan includes bus rapid transit [BRT], subways, facilities and terminals, operations centres, new vehicles and related infrastructure, including intelligent transportation systems technology and the delivery of a beautiful complete street.

Future Projects

Yonge North Subway Extension

- > 7.4 km extension from Finch Terminal to Richmond Hill Centre
- > 5 stations
- > 2 transit terminals
- > 2,000 parking spaces

Key benefits:

- Shorter commute times
- Services 165,000 riders/day
- 2,500 fewer bus trips/day down Yonge Street
- Reduces 28 tonnes of greenhouse gases/year
- Creates 21,800 person-years of employment
- Fuels approximately 48,000 new residents and 31,000 jobs in the Richmond Hill/Langstaff Urban Growth Centre anchor hub

Future Projects

- Last June Metrolinx recommended the YNSE project proceed to 15% preliminary design and engineering following the results and analysis of the Yonge Relief Network Study
- The Yonge North Subway Extension project is now on track and moving forward thanks to the generous support of the Government of Ontario to begin the 15% preliminary design and engineering
- > YRRTC continues to work with York Region to advocate for capital funding of \$4.0 billion (in 2015 dollars) from Senior Levels of Government

Viva bus rapid transit project

- An additional 34.2 kilometres of dedicated, centre lane bus rapidways requires funding
- Includes 26 vivastations along Highway 7, Yonge Street and Green Lane and will be updated in the 2016 Annual Report to reflect the priorities
- > The Environmental Assessments are completed
- These projects are ready to move to preliminary engineering, design and construction


Key benefits:

- Builds on the existing 34.6km of the BRT network
- Matches Federal, Provincial and Municipal priorities
- Adds critical connectivity to vivaNext BRT routes already in service

Highway 7 West rapidway Vaughan nhase under construction expected opening

phase 1 - rapidway construction [2012-2016 phase 2 - rapidway construction [2016-2019]

phase 1 - Edgeley Boulevard to Jane Street

- Schedule coordinated with Toronto-York Spadina Subway Extension [TYSSE] project
- Vaughan Metropolitan Centre Spadina Subway vivastation on Highway 7 will include entrance to TYSSE
- Road widening completed and boulevard work ongoing

phase 1 - Jane Street to east of Bowes Road

- Four vivastation canopies installed at Keele Street and Creditstone Road
- CN MacMillan Bridge expansion completed
- Road widening completed and utility relocations nearing completion
- Boulevard work between Jane and Creditstone completed and permanent streetlight installation nearing completion

phase 2 - Helen Street to Edgeley Boulevard / Bowes Road to Yonge Street via Bathurst and Centre

- Design-build-finance contract awarded in September for 12 kilometres of new rapidway
- Pre-construction work underway: environmental, geotechnical and utility investigations
- Utility work, including water main replacements, begins in 2016 with heavy construction starting in 2017







- > Design & Engineering Services are underway


