



Supporting Tenants

Programs & Partnerships

- Partnerships with the Central Local Health Integration Network (CLHIN) and CLHIN funded agencies for programs and support services, such as the Seniors' Social Worker services
- Community development programs and collaborative community partnerships to provide supports and that encourage seniors to engage in their communities

- Formalize and expand community partnerships
- Explore opportunities to enhance programs and services


Supporting Senior Homeowners

Home Repair Program

- Grants of up to \$7,500/year (lifetime maximum of \$15,000) for accessibility modifications or critical repairs to applicant's home
- Home must be affordable, with assessed value below \$443,874 and the total household income must be \$77,276 or less
- 54 applicants were approved in 2015 (77% were seniors)



Current Opportunities

- Expand HYI activities into new business models
- Unionville development project
- Continue working with key partners, including nonprofit/co-operative housing providers, the CLHIN and community agencies to support seniors in social housing and the community.

Advocacy To Do More

Sustained funding from senior levels of government

- Repair and renew existing seniors buildings and help aging homeowners stay in their homes
- Mitigate the cost of adapting buildings to meet evolving safety and accessibility requirements
- Support new housing development
- Increase the number of rent subsidies
- Provide appropriate care and related supports to seniors
