1 Roads Capital Construction Program Update

Committee of the Whole recommends:

1. Recommendation

It is recommended that this report be received for information.

2. Purpose

This report provides an update on the status of the 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program.

3. Background

The Region intends to invest \$1.4B in the maintenance and expansion of Regional road infrastructure

The 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program (the Program) has a total budget of \$1.4B, and includes growth-related projects worth approximately \$1.2B, and maintenance/renewal projects with a value of \$270M.

The 2015 Program budget includes \$112M for growth and maintenance/ renewal projects located throughout the Region. Attachment 1 shows the locations of current construction projects. A summary of all projects currently being undertaken is shown in Attachment 2.

Capital Planning and Delivery Branch focuses on the timely delivery of projects

The primary focus of the Capital Planning and Delivery Branch is the timely delivery of projects included in the approved 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program, with the secondary focus on delivering maintenance/ renewal projects to maintain our road infrastructure in good condition.

2015 has been a busy and successful year, with 31 contracts tendered for major and minor projects. All planned growth projects with construction commencing in 2015 have been tendered, and tenders for 2016 projects are on track to be delivered as planned.

This report describes the status of current projects and plans for the remainder of 2015 and through 2016.

4. Analysis and Options

The 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program focuses on growth and state of good repair projects

The Program includes two general categories of projects. The first category, growth projects, focuses on the expansion of the Regional road network infrastructure and creation of new infrastructure. The second category, state of good repair, focuses on the maintenance and renewal of existing transportation infrastructure. The Program is robust, adding capacity to the Region's road network and maintaining our current infrastructure.

The Program budget has increased from \$467M over the 2011-2015 term of Council to over \$624M budgeted for the 2015-2018 term of Council. This represents a 33 per cent increase in the program or an average increase of \$40M a year over this four year term of Council.

Delivery of growth projects takes eight to ten years from concept to end of construction

Typical growth-related road improvement projects take eight to ten years to complete. Before a project can proceed to construction, the projects go through planning, environmental assessment, detailed design, property acquisition and utility relocations, with the duration of each phase depending on the scope and complexity of the project being undertaken. Staff are therefore working on many projects planned for future years as well as projects currently under construction.



State of Good Repair Program focuses on the maintenance and renewal of existing infrastructure

The State of Good Repair Program includes pavement repair/preservation/ rehabilitation projects, bridge/culvert rehabilitations or replacements, roadside safety device (i.e. guiderail) improvements, and intersection improvements such as the installation or modification of traffic control signals, adding zebra markings at crosswalks, and upgrades to intersections to bring them into compliance with the new Access for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) requirements.

State of Good Repair Program projects have a shorter delivery period

State of Good Repair Program projects are generally smaller in scope and less complex than growth projects, and therefore are delivered much faster. Most projects take two years to complete, with planning, design and approvals being completed in year one, and tendering and construction occurring in year two.

The Region continues to increase its investment in the State of Good Repair Program

The Region currently invests \$25M per year to maintain the overall condition of our road infrastructure and corresponding service levels for our communities. Numerous maintenance and renewal projects were tendered and constructed in 2015 as shown in Attachments 1 and 2.

In order to maintain our roads, traffic signals, and bridges and culverts at their current overall condition, the Region's investment in road improvement projects will need to increase over time. Progressively increasing the Region's budget for renewal projects will enable vital transportation assets to maintain to current service levels to minimize the overall cost of maintaining road infrastructure over its life cycle.

Link to key Council-approved plans

Improving the Region's transportation infrastructure is a key priority area for the 2015-2018 term of Council. Council has allocated significant resources for the expansion and maintenance/renewal of Regional road infrastructure.

The 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program aligns with the 2015-2018 Strategic Plan priority area to manage environmentally sustainable growth. Implementation of the Program is key to the Region achieving the strategic objectives of managing traffic congestion and optimizing critical infrastructure systems capacity.

5. Financial Implications

The 2015 Roads Capital Construction Program budget is shown in Table 1.

The 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program is on track to exceed the delivery target of 90 per cent

The 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program is on track to exceed the 90 per cent delivery target of the 2015 budget. Meeting the budget target is an important indicator that project milestones are being achieved.

With Council's increased focus on improving the Region's transportation infrastructure, the 2016 capital budget is planned to rise from \$112M in 2015 to \$161M in 2016 as shown in Table 1, subject to Council approval. This significant increase reflects the amount of construction work that has been committed through projects that have been tendered in 2015, and those to be tendered in 2016.

6. Local Municipal Impact

Regional staff continue to work closely with staff from local municipalities to ensure their concerns are addressed and infrastructure needs are included as part of Region projects. Infrastructure such as watermains and sewers, streetlights, sidewalks and multi-use paths are routinely incorporated into Region construction contracts at the request of local municipalities. In 2015 and 2016, \$17M in local municipal infrastructure will be included in Regional projects.

The successful and timely delivery of key infrastructure is critical to meet the needs of our residents and businesses and to manage the impacts of growth throughout the Region.

7. Conclusion

The Region continues to invest significant resources in the expansion and maintenance of Regional road infrastructure, with a number of large projects underway that will be delivered in the 2015-2018 Council term.

The 2015 10-Year Roads Capital Construction Program is on track to exceed the delivery target of 90 per cent of the 2015 budget, and all 2015 construction projects are scheduled to be delivered as planned.


