# MESSAGE FROM YORK REGION CHAIRMAN AND CEO


As we approach the end of 2021, we have many accomplishments to proudly look back on.

This time last year COVID-19 vaccines in Canada were not yet approved, and the end of the pandemic seemed very far off. One year later, more than 86% of York Region eligible residents have received two doses of vaccine and more than 88.5% have received their first dose.

Our residents over the age of 70, health care workers and those most at-risk are being offered an additional vaccine booster. Children age 5 to 11 are also now eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

By all appearances, we are seeing light at the end of the tunnel. Please, if you haven't already, do your part to help Ontario achieve a complete reopening by being fully vaccinated against this virus.

York Region's Official Plan manages growth by guiding how land in our communities should be used, now and in the future. Following ongoing public engagement, an updated draft Region Official Plan is now available for review.

The draft is based on input we've received from Regional Council, the community, local municipalities, Indigenous communities and stakeholders. Now we would like your feedback on the policies in the draft plan.


Since the last update in 2010, many provincial plans have been changed, resulting in the need to update the Regional Official Plan to align with revised provincial requirements, including planning for unprecedented growth for a population of 2 million people and 900,000 jobs in 2051.

# What's new?

- Directing more growth to lands surrounding transit stations or stops to align growth with transit infrastructure investments and ensure easy access to transit
- Promoting affordable housing choices through Regional targets for purpose-built rental units in each municipality
- Establishing Regional employment area boundaries for long-term protection of land for industrial, business, transportation and warehousing uses


We continue to expand our Mobility On-Request service

# Safe travels begin by being prepared

York Region road crews and a fleet of 123 snow plows are ready to deliver the Region's winter maintenance program, including snow removal, sanding and salting.

Travellers can do their part to stay safe during colder months by adjusting driving habits to weather conditions. Slow down, allow for extra time, watch for pedestrians and leave space around large vehicles, including snow plows, buses and transport trucks.

The Region's large road network carries more than 2.6 million trips every day.

# Where do your water dollars go?

From its source, water is collected, treated, pumped, stored, continuously tested and monitored – all before reaching your tap. When you pay for water, you are covering the cost of each step it takes to deliver clean, safe drinking water to your home and for the collection and treatment of your wastewater.

Your water dollars go towards protecting our water sources, testing and monitoring your water quality, repairing and maintaining our pipes and sewers and so much more. We all play a vital role in maintaining a safe, reliable and resilient water and wastewater system now and for future generations. Minimize your water footprint by:

- Turning off the tap while you brush your teeth – this can save up to 16 litres of water each time
- Keeping a cold jug of water in the fridge or use a few ice cubes to cool your water instead of running the tap until the water is cold

- Only running the dishwasher and washing machine with a full load
- Conducting a whole home leak test to check for large or several small leaks; for example, a leaking toilet can waste up to 200,000 litres of water per year but can go almost unnoticed

# Did you know?

One litre of tap water costs about \$0.01. One litre of bottled water costs about \$1.50, plus the cost to dispose the bottle. Learn more about water at york.ca/wateris
