
We hope you enjoy exploring different elements of public works with your students!




The Waste-Sorting Game

Instructions:

Help Pylon Pete figure out what goes in the Blue Bin, Compost Bin and Garbage Bin. Colour and cut out the pictures, then glue them in the correct bin.





Repurposed Items Craft

Instructions:

Create your own community! Ask each student in your class to design and decorate their own building using toilet paper rolls and/or small boxes. Put all the completed buildings together to create a mini community.

Materials required: Toilet paper rolls and/or small boxes (eg: boxes from pudding, macaroni and cheese, soup mix, etc), construction paper, glue sticks, tape, paint, paint brushes, markers, scissors

Step 1: Have each student select a paper roll or box to decorate. Use paint to decorate the exterior (or cover with construction paper if preferred).

Step 2: Add doors and windows by painting or drawing them onto the building. You can also have students draw these on squares of construction paper while their paint is drying, and then tape or glue them on.

Step 3: Create a roof for each building using a piece of folded construction paper. Students can draw on shingles with pens or markers. Attach them to the buildings with tape or glue.

Use these prompts to give students specific buildings, or let them use their creativity and come up with their own ideas: If you aren't together in the classroom, have your students submit photos of their creations afterwards to make a slideshow, and take a virtual tour through your town together!




Great Outdoors Scavenger Hunt Bingo


Page 3 – The Waste-Sorting Game

- Garbage: styrofoam container




