RE: Accessibility (Compliance) Report on the Accessibility for

Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA): Compliance with the Design of Public Spaces Requirements – January 1, 2016

This memo offers an update on any activities undertaken by York Region, York Regional Police and the York Regional Police Services Board to comply with the 2016 Design of Public Spaces (DOPS) requirements of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 (AODA).

Under the AODA (Section 29.4) municipal accessibility advisory committees must provide advice to municipal councils on the requirements and implementation of the accessibility standards and compliance reports. The York Region Accessibility Advisory Committee (YRAAC) fulfills this function. This memo serves to fulfill this obligation for the 2016 AODA requirements.

New AODA accessibility standards for the Design of Public Spaces became law January 1, 2016. The standards include accessibility requirements for:

- Recreational trails and beach access routes
- Outdoor, public-use eating areas like rest stops or picnic grounds
- Outdoor play spaces such as playgrounds in parks and communities
- Public outdoor paths of travel including sidewalks and pedestrian signals
- On and off-street parking areas
- Service counters, fixed waiting lines and waiting areas with fixed seating
- Maintenance and service disruptions

The standards apply to public spaces that are new or undergoing planned significant redevelopment and do not require that public spaces be retrofitted to meet compliance.

Accessibility (Compliance) Report on the AODA: Compliance with the Design of Public Spaces Requirements – January 1, 2016

The Region has incorporated the Design of Public Spaces requirements in design criteria for projects initiated on or after January 1, 2013 and will continue this practice.

York Region, and the York Regional Police have completed requirements in all of these areas. A summary of compliance activities is attached as Appendix A.

York Region must report to the Province on AODA compliance activities

The AODA requires large public sector organizations like York Region to file two reports that document compliance. Information in this report will be use to complete these legislated reports:

- 1. Annual Status Report Outlines actions taken to meet the AODA requirements and must be made publicly available. The next status report will be posted online at york.ca by December 31, 2016.
- 2. Bi-Annual Accessibility (Compliance) Report to the provincial government York Region, York Regional Police and the York Regional Police Services Board submit one combined report. The next one is due by December 31, 2017.

This memo will be forwarded to the York Regional Police Services Board for their information. Staff will continue to monitor AODA compliance activities and provide regular updates to Council. This information will be used to meet provincial AODA reporting requirements.
