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

The YTN has grown from a single connection in 2002 to a 157km network in 2015, with the potential for much more growth


- RedMobile Report
- Done to understand current operations
- Recommends formalizing as a public entity
- Prior & Prior Report
- Done to understand stakeholders needs and desires
- Identifies a Region/ MUSH partnership as most desirable

- IBI Report
- Done to analyze at a high level governance models and their financial feasibility
- Identifies operating a dark fibre network as Region-owned entity with MUSH subscribers as a viable alternative

Eight of the Nine Local Municipalities expressed a preference for the Region + MUSH Partnership option

Positioning YTN – Spectrum of Services vs. Governance Model



Policy Direction Considerations:

- Role and Scope
 - Within York Region boundaries
 - Dark fibre network
 - Supports York Region's connectivity needs
 - Assist in meeting local municipal, university, school and healthcare (MUSH) connectivity needs
 - Non-dominant carrier (CRTC regulations: more than \$10M revenue requires additional reporting)
 - Not competitive with private sector Internet Service Providers
- Ownership
 - Region-owned and operated
 - Potential future local MUSH ownership participation
 - Potential private sector joint builds, leased YTN fibre agreements, pilot projects
- Governance
 - Arms length entity; Board comprised of Regional Council members
- Users
 - Region and MUSH sector
- Financials
 - Capital and operating cost recovery over time through user fees

Policy direction aligns with the three priority areas in the Broadband Strategy-Education and Advocacy, Municipal Process and Infrastructure Investment
