CULTURAL HERITAGE EXISTING CONDITIONS BRIEF, SCHEDULE B MUNICIPAL CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT, WATER SYSTEM UPGRADES, WHITCHURCH STOUFFVILLE, ONTARIO.

Executive Summary

Based on background research and a desktop survey, this Cultural Heritage Existing Conditions Brief for the Whitchurch-Stouffville Water System Upgrades determined that:

■ There are several known cultural heritage resources and high probability of additional potential cultural heritage resources in the Study Area.

Golder therefore recommends that future planning for the Whitchurch-Stouffville Water System Upgrades:

Avoid the Stouffville Heritage Area and known cemeteries in the Study Area.

If avoidance is not feasible, Golder recommends to:

■ Conduct site-specific Heritage Impact Assessments prior to any development proposed for, or adjacent to, properties in the Stouffville Heritage Area or the cemeteries identified in this technical memorandum.

For all other areas, Golder recommends to:

■ Conduct a Cultural Heritage Assessment Report once the preferred water system upgrade locations are selected.

Background & Summary

The Municipal Infrastructure Group (TMIG) retained Golder Associates Ltd. (Golder) to undertake a Cultural Heritage Existing Conditions Brief as part of a Schedule B Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for water system upgrades in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, Regional Municipality of York, Ontario (the Study Area) (Figure 1).

The purpose of this brief was to identify the cultural heritage resources of value or interest in the Study Area, and determine if the project will require subsequent cultural heritage studies such as Cultural Heritage Assessment Reports (CHAR) or Heritage Impact Assessments (HIA). Guidance for identifying cultural heritage resources in a project area is provided in the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS) *Ontario Heritage Tool Kit* series, and *Criteria for Evaluating Potential for Built Heritage Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes* (2016).

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Study Area & Method

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The Study Area covers approximately 51 km² at the southeast corner of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville. It includes the community of Stouffville with boundaries at Vandorf Sideroad to the north, York-Durham Line to the east, 19th Avenue to the south, and McCowan Road to the west (Figure 1; Attachment A).

Desktop survey of the Study Area involved the following tasks:

Task 1: Background research

Federal, provincial, and municipal heritage registers, inventories, and databases were reviewed to identify known cultural heritage resources in the Study Area. This included review of the:

- Canadian Register of Historic Places (www.historicplaces.ca);
- Government of Canada Directory of Federal Heritage Designations (http://www.pc.gc.ca/apps/dfhd/searchrecherche_eng.aspx);
- Ontario Heritage Trust Online Plaque Guide (http://www.heritagetrust.on.ca/en/index.php/online-plaque-
- Ontario Heritage Trust Ontario Places of Worship Inventory (http://www.heritagetrust.on.ca/en/index.php/places-of-worship/places-of-worship-database);
- 'Pioneer Cemeteries' section of the York Region Heritage Directory: Resources & Contacts, 2009 Edition (http://www.eastgwillimbury.ca/assets/library/york+region+heritage+directory+2009.htm);
- Ontario Ministry of Government and Consumer Services (OMGCS) Database of Registered Cemeteries (https://www.consumerbeware.mgs.gov.on.ca/esearch/cemeterySearch.do?eformsId=0); and,
- Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville Built Heritage Inventory (http://www.townofws.ca/en/townhall/resources/documents/news/bhi_stouffville_record_list.pdf)

Other sources consulted were:

- The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville Official Plan and Community of Stouffville Secondary Plan;

Task 2: Stakeholder Consultation

Golder contacted Kennedy Self, Manager of Planning with Development Services at the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville by phone on July 7, 2017, about the cultural heritage constraints in the Study Area, to identify further sources of information on cultural heritage in the municipality, and confirm that the data in the online municipal inventory was current and valid.



Task 3: MTCS Checklist & Field Investigation

Based on the information compiled during Tasks 1 & 2, the MTCS *Criteria for Evaluating Potential for Built Heritage Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes* (2015) checklist was completed for the Study Area (Attachment B).

Results

The Study Area contains the following known cultural heritage resources (Figure 2; Attachment C):

- Four (4) protected heritage properties designated under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.
 - 19 North Civic Avenue, Stouffville (Clock Tower);
 - 19 South Civic Avenue, Stouffville (now the Lebovic Centre for Arts & Entertainment since 2009);
 - 6060 Main Street, Stouffville (Residence); and,
 - 6528 Main Street, Stouffville (Memorial Christian Church).
- One (1) 'Heritage Area'
 - The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville Official Plan and Community of Stouffville Secondary Plan have designated a Heritage Area in downtown Stouffville; however, this is not designated as a Heritage Conservation District under Part V of the Ontario Heritage Act.
 - The Manager of Planning with Development Services identified the Heritage Area as the most significant concentration of known and potential heritage resources in the community, and the most important heritage constraint.
 - The four protected heritage properties included above as well as many of the 360 properties listed on the Town's Built Heritage Inventory are located in the Heritage Area.
- Four (4) cemeteries including:
 - Baker Hill Baptist Church Cemetery, 13448 Highway 48;
 - Bloomington Methodist Cemetery, 13659 Ninth Line;
 - Lemonville United Church Cemetery, 4871 Bloomington Road; and,
 - Stouffville Cemetery, 12118 Tenth Line.
- One (1) heritage plaque
 - The plaque commemorating the Founding of Stouffville is located on the north side of Main Street in front of Latcham Gallery (6240 Main Street);

These represent only the known or recognized cultural heritage resources, and there is high potential that the Study Area also includes a high number of properties of potential cultural heritage value or interest



Recommendations

Given the number of known resources and high probability of additional potential cultural heritage resources in the Study Area, Golder recommends that future planning for the Whitchurch-Stouffville Water System Upgrades:

Avoid the Stouffville Heritage Area and known cemeteries in the Study Area.

If avoidance of this area or cemeteries is not feasible, Golder recommends to:

Conduct site-specific Heritage Impact Assessments prior to any development proposed for, or adjacent to, properties in the Stouffville Heritage Area or the cemeteries identified in this technical memorandum.

For all other areas, Golder recommends to:

■ Conduct a Cultural Heritage Assessment Report once the preferred water system upgrade locations are selected.


